Dear Mr Thoma

Thank you for your letter and \$100 cheque which I recieved on the 9 January 1998.

The search which you requested into your ancestor of the Mc Quigg family from ,Knockaduff,Aghadowey Parish,County Londonderry,is in progress but I has suspended the investigation so as to advise of the current state of the research.

The present investigation began In the County Londonderry Householder's Index. To explain - in the years between 1848 and 1864 Ireland was survey for land and property Taxation purposes. This Survey was known as the Primary Valuation of Tenements in Ireland and it was supervised by Sir Richard Griffith,Bart. As a result of the name of this supervisor, this survey became more popularly known as 'Griffith's Valuation'. This Valuation is arranged by Parishes within given Poor Law Unions and then by townland within each parish. The actual information records the name of the townland, the lot or plot number, the name of the occupier, the name of the Immediate Lessor,a description of the property usually expressed as land,office (ie outside barns,etc) land, the acreage,the valuation of the buildings,the valuation of the land and the total valuation.

In the 1950's the National Library of Ireland compiled an index of the surnames only of the heads of householder's in every Parish in Ireland and this information in volumes known as the Householder's Index. There is a Householder's Index relating to every county in Ireland,indeed due to the size of some counties such as County Cork, there are several volumes covering such counties. The Householders Index is arranged by County and then subdiced into Parishes, Baronies, and Poor Law Unions.The information recorded in the Householder's Index is the actual numbers of the heads of households as recorded in Griffth's Valuation. Thus an entry can read '6 McQuig Aghadowey Parish: this means that in 1859 (the date Griffith's Valuation was undertaken in Aghadowey Parish) there were six heads of householders recorded in that Parish. Also given in the Householder's Index is a notation as to whether persons named Mc Quigg paid tithes in Aghadowey Parish in 1833. Tithes were a tax on agricultural land and this tax was paid to the Church of Ireland irrespective of the religion of the tithe payer.

During the present research the whole of Griffith's Valuation relating to Aghadowey Parish and Aghadowey Tithe Applotment Book dated 1833, were examined. All Quigg and Mc Quigg recorded in these sources were noted and the results of this research are recorded in the enclosed Search Report.

In the years between 1859 and 1929 the information recorded in Griffith's Valuation was updated at given years. This updated information is recorded in manuscript notebooks known as the Townland Revision Books. This source is arranged by District Electoral Divisions: the relevant Division relating to Knockaduff townland, Aghadowey Parish is that of Agivey District Electoral Division. The information recorded in this source is exactly the same as that which is recorded in Griffith's Valuation but with the important addition that any and all changes were noted and dated by the Valuers. In addition to this source also records the Irish Land Commission Folio Number relating to every property in every townland: the Irish Land Commission Papers relate to the sale of lands in Ireland to tenant farmers.

The Irish Land Commission Papers are held at the Public Record Office Of N. Ireland . There is an alphabetical Index of the Landlord whose names occur in the Irish Land Commission Papers but unfortunately there is no index of tenants. The Irish Land Commission Papers, depending upon the size of a given estate, can contain Lease and other information relating to individual families such as the Mc Quigg's who purchased land through the Irish Land Commissioners. The difficulty in regard to this source is that there is no way of telling beforehand as to the actual size of a given archive relating to a particular landlord whose records are deposited in the Irish Land Commission Papers, without actually examining this source. Depending upon the size of given archives, such research can be time consuming and there is no guarantee of a successful outcome.

As a result of the above comments, the Irish Land Commission Papers were not examined during the present research. Should you so wish this archive can be examined on your behalf.

The next step in the present investigation was an examination of the Calendars of Wills and Administrations from 1858 to 1900 Inclusive. I am sorry to say that although some Wills relating to Mc Quigg of Culcrow, etc, were noted, no Will or Administration relating to your Mc Quigg ancestors of Knockaduff, was located.

In Ireland almost all Census Returns from the first official Census taken in 1821, were destroyed in Dublin during the Civil War in Ireland in 1922. As a result the only complete Censuses of Ireland now surviving is the 1901 and the 1911 Census Returns. During the present research, the 1901 Census relating to Knockaduff townland was examined. This research located Malcolm McQuigg, aged 67, his wife and two sons (see Page 8 of the enclosed Report). The 1911 Census is only available for inspection at the National Archives, Dublin and this Census was not examined during the present investigation. In 1831 Thomas Mc Quigg is recorded in the 1831 Census relating to Knockaduff, Aghadowey Parish.

At this point in the investigation a number of sources were examined including school registers, church registers, Proni personal names index, etc. The registers of Aghadowey Presbyterian Church were examined and all references to Mc Quigg were noted (see enclosed Report for information and dates covered).

During the present research the registers of Ballylintagh Presbyterian Congregation were not examined: the only surviving register relating to this church is marriages which cover the period from 1872 to 1882 only. This Congregation was dissolved in 1883. The Presbyterian Church registers relating to ~~Killaig Presbyterian Church~~ for baptisms cover the period from 1860 to 1944 and for marriages from 1865 to 1903. This register which is on microfilm at the Public Record Office of N. Ireland, was not examined on this occasion. In addition to the above there are also baptism from 1805 to 1856 and a communicants roll dated 1749 to 1918 relating to Killaig Presbyterian Congregation. This portion of Killaig Presbyterian Church registers are held at the Presbyterian Historical Society in downtown Belfast. These registers were not examined during the present research.

Finally the registers of Ringsend Presbyterian Church, Aghadowey Parish - the baptism register of this church covers the period from 1871 to 1937 and the marriage register covers the period from 1845 to 1902. Microfilm copies of the registers of Ringsend Presbyterian Church are held on microfilm at PRONI. These registers were not examined.

In addition to the above registers, there are some records relating to the Ironmongers estate located at Agivey/Macosquin and Aghadowey held at the Public Record Office of N. Ireland. These records consist of Minute Books, etc dating from c1609: letters from c1833: account books dating from 1833, maps, 1(42/3, survey 1842: three rent ledgers/rent books dating from 1869, all held at PRONI, Belfast. In addition to this there are three archives held at PRONI which relate to the general area around Coleraine which were compiled by a Max Given (Some of these archives relate to families in this area and I understand that the name Mc Quigg may be included in the Given archive). You may also be interested to know that the Rev T.H. Mullin, published a history of Aghadowey called **AGHADOWEY: A PARISH AND ITS LINEN INDUSTRY**, Belfast 1972. This book which contains some 260 pages, is long out of print and is now only available at Libraries. This book contains various lists of names and has also a useful list of sources relating to Aghadowey.

As you will appreciate it would be impossible to examine all of the above mentioned sources within a monetary research budget of \$200 US. As a result I decided to suspend the present investigation so as to advise you accordingly. Should you wish to commission research in the above mentioned sources and possibly through the records of the Registry of Deeds which date from 1708 onwards, I would suggest that you consider a further research budget of \$300 US to which amount I would work up to and report accordingly. This fee, which is payable in advance, will not be exceeded. The cost of the present research is \$150 US, less the \$100 US received, leaving a balance due of \$50 US.

Thank you for commissioning research into your ancestors and I look forward to hearing from you.

Thank you for your letter and \$150 cheque which arrived back in March. Please except my apologies for the delay in the completion of your research. This was due to a number of factors not least of which was the computerisation of the records at the archives. This factor alone has caused delays in all research and even now computers can still be 'down' at unexpected occasions.

This letter is by way on an interum Report in that I have now expended your remittance and as a result it was necessary to suspend the present investigation so as to advise you accordingly. The present research included a search in the old Session Book relating to Aghadowey Presbyterian Congregation in which some early references to O'Quig are listed on the lists of the poor recorded in this register (see enclosed Report and also the enclosed photocopy from the Aghadowey Presbyterian Church Old Session Book). A number of other sources were examined including the registers of Bushmills Presbyterian Church, etc. (per enclosed Report).

At present the Libraries in Belfast are closed for the annual July holiday period and as a result of which it has not been possible to examine the book **AGHADOWEY : A Parish and Its Linnen History** by the Rev T.H.Mullin. Also no research has been possible in the Registry of Deeds, the records of which commence in 1708. In addition to this I might make mention that I was examining the 1803 Census recorded in the registers of Ballintoy Church of Ireland County Antrim on behalf of another client and during this research I noticed that there were some Quigg and Mc Quigg recorded in this source. Unfortunately research time did not permit a full examination of this 1803 Census. Note: The Church of Ireland registers relating to Ballintoy Parish, County Antrim were destroyed during the Civil War in Ireland in 1922. The above mentioned 1803 Census however was recorded in the Vestry Book relating to Ballintoy Parish Church of Ireland which was not effected by the fire. This 1803 Census includes Church of Ireland persons and Dissenters (ie Presbyterians and covers a wide area around the Ballintoy area. I wonder if you would wish to have a full examination of this Census (which is not indexed) for possible Quigg /Mc Quigg references ?. You can let me know about this.

Some time ago I was speaking to Jennifer Cunningham, 45 Knockaduff Road, Aghadowey, Coleraine, County Londonderry. Mrs Cunningham is a very known historian in the Aghadowey area and during the course of our conversation I happened to mentioned that I was presently undertaking research into the Mc Quigg's of Aghadowey. Following this conversation Mrs Cunningham has forwarded to me the enclosed information relating to Mc Quigg's and asked me if I would forward this information to you in case it might be of some help to your research. The information provided by Mrs Cunningham is enclosed as I recieved it and I have made no attempt to sort out or interpret this information. On receipt of this information, perhaps you would be kind enough to write a letter to Mrs Cinnungham to thank her for the enclosed information.

In regard to your research account - your £150US covered the fee for the present research and also the \$50 Us owed from the previous investigation. As a result your research account is clear.

Once again thank you for commissioning research into your ancestors and if I can be of any further assistance, please do not hesitate to contact me.

Thank you for your letter and the enclosed international reply coupon.

✓ Regarding the Will of William McQuigg, Dunluce 1797 - if a copy still exists this can be photocopied at the PRONI, at 66 Balmoral Avenue, Belfast - this normally costs 40p per sheet.

✓ Yes, there were shipping lists for the 1820/30 period but these do not always give much detail. These lists appear in the Public Record Book. Lists for 1811-1817 appear in a publication 'Passengers from Ireland' - lists of passengers arriving at American ports between 1811 and 1817 by Donald M Schlegel, published by the Genealogical Pub, Co. Inc., Baltimore in 1980.

✓ Lists for 1804-06 are held in the PRO - ref No T521/1. Lists for 1833/34 appear in the OS Memoirs for various parishes and local lists appear in a book, 'Gleanings of Co Londonderry,' by S Martin Published 1930.

✓ Other lists appear in 'Emigrants to Pennsylvania 1644 - 1819 edited by Michael Tepper and published by the Genealogical Pub Co in 1975 and in 'Ulster Emigration to Colonial America' 1718-1775 by R J Dickson. Mrs Ellen Rankin (nee McQuigg) was I believe one of the McQuiggs of Knockaduff. In 1901 she was living at Keely Cottage on the Moneybrannon Road, Aghadowey, with her niece, . She was married to one of the Rankins, of the Curragh. One of these men later became Mayor of a city in England (possibly Middlesborough).

✓ I found it interesting to read that family tradition has your ancestors arriving in Ireland from Aran, although I believe at a slightly later date, 1603 is very early as the Plantation was around 1608/1609.

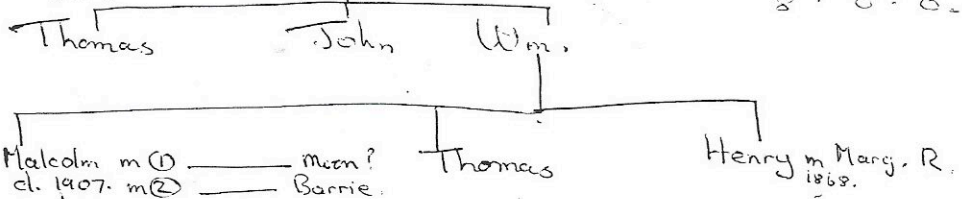

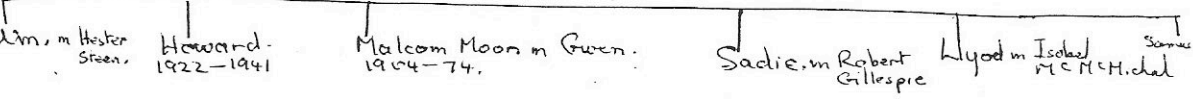
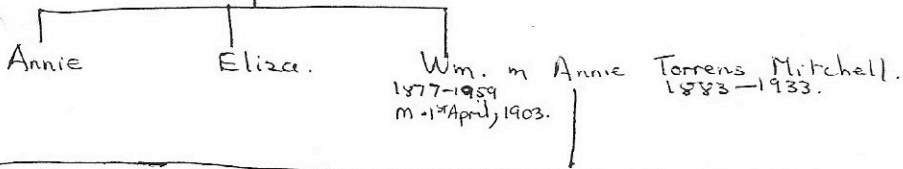

It was very kind of you to send me such a long & complete family history. I have read it with great interest & as it is original typescript I return it herewith.

I don't remember whether I told you that my father's aunt Mrs. Roubin held the view that our family McQuigg was a branch of the Clan McLeod (pronounced McCloud). I thought for some time that McQuigg was gaelic for McLeod, but Irish scholars tell me that this is not so. It may be, however, that what I thought correct in Scottish gaelic.

You must understand that Northern Irish & Western Scottish are very much the same stock of people. St. Patrick established the Christian Church in Ireland (the Celtic Church) in 433. St. Columba took the same Church to Scotland with many settlers in 563. Memorial stones in old graveyards in Ireland & Scotland consist in large measure of Celtic crosses. 

I am sure you know that Mc means son of, and O' grandson of. It is generally accepted here that the name McQuigg is quite separate & distinct from all other expressions of the name & that is one of the reasons why I think we may be part of the Clan McLeod.

At the time of the Plantation of Ulster probably about the late 17th Century, three brothers named McQuigg emigrated from the Western Isles of Scotland (The Hebrides). Two of them settled in Ireland; one in the Bushmills area of County Antrim and one at Aghadowey district, County Londonderry. The third emigrated to Australia. The descendants of the Australian immigrant were in communication with my family up to two generations ago. All this I learned from my father, William McQuigg, and from his aunt, Mrs. Ellen Rankin (nee McQuigg) of Curragh, Aghadowey, formerly head-mistress of Culcrow Girls School.

The first record extant is an old headstone in Agivey Old Graveyard to Malcolm McQuigg of Knockaduff who died in 1817 aged 57 years, also his wife, Jane Stewart of Collins, my great great grandparents. The next generation was William McQuigg and his wife Eliza Moon of Clarehill, then Malcolm McQuigg (my grandfather) and his wife Eliza McQuigg of Culcrow who was also his cousin. My father's name was again William, and my mother Annie Torrens Mitchell of Ruskey.

My father and mother's family consisted of eight (six boys and two girls). In addition one boy (unnamed) died at birth). Our names are:-

Thank you for your letter and \$100 Cheque which arrived back in August. Please except my apologies for the delay in responding: this was due to a number of factors not least of which was the computer systems at the archives which were 'down' thus causing dealys in ordering documents, etc.

The research which your requested began with an examination of the I803 Census recorded in the Vestry Minute Book relating to Ballintoy Church of Ireland, County Antrim. This Cenus is not indexed and it is a rather large document: all of this Census was examined and all references to Quigg/Mc Quigg were noted. This Census extends beyond the boundaries of Ballintoy Parish and some of the townlands names are either written in rather old, quaint hand writing or the are difficult to decipher. Where possible I have used the correct spellings of townland names in the enclosed Report but there are still a few which I have not been able to positively identify and these are indicated with a question mark.

The present research also included an examination of various County Antrim Tombstone inscription (Manuscript copies) and an examination of selected documents from the Given Archive which is listed at the Public Record Office of N.Ireland under reference list of D/2096. No relevant information was located in these sources. I have read and re-read the **Rev T.H.Mullin's book, AGHADOWEY: A PARISH AND ITS LINEN INDUSTRY**, published in Belfast in I872. In this publication there are several references to O'Quige (Pages 32 & I44 & 238). I am enclosing some photocopies from this Book particularly various lists of names for various dates from cI63I to I833. Hopefully these will be of some general interest to you. The Rev Mullin's book is long out of print: this Book contains around two hundred and sixty pages including title pages, list of contents, index, etc. and could be photocopied at an approximate cost of around £20 plus postage.

Your cheque covered the fee for the present research and as of writing your research account is clear. I agree with you that the present research is now at an end: there is no other possible avenues of research now extant. Thank you for commissioning research into your ancestors and if I can be of any further assistance, please do not hesitate to contact me.

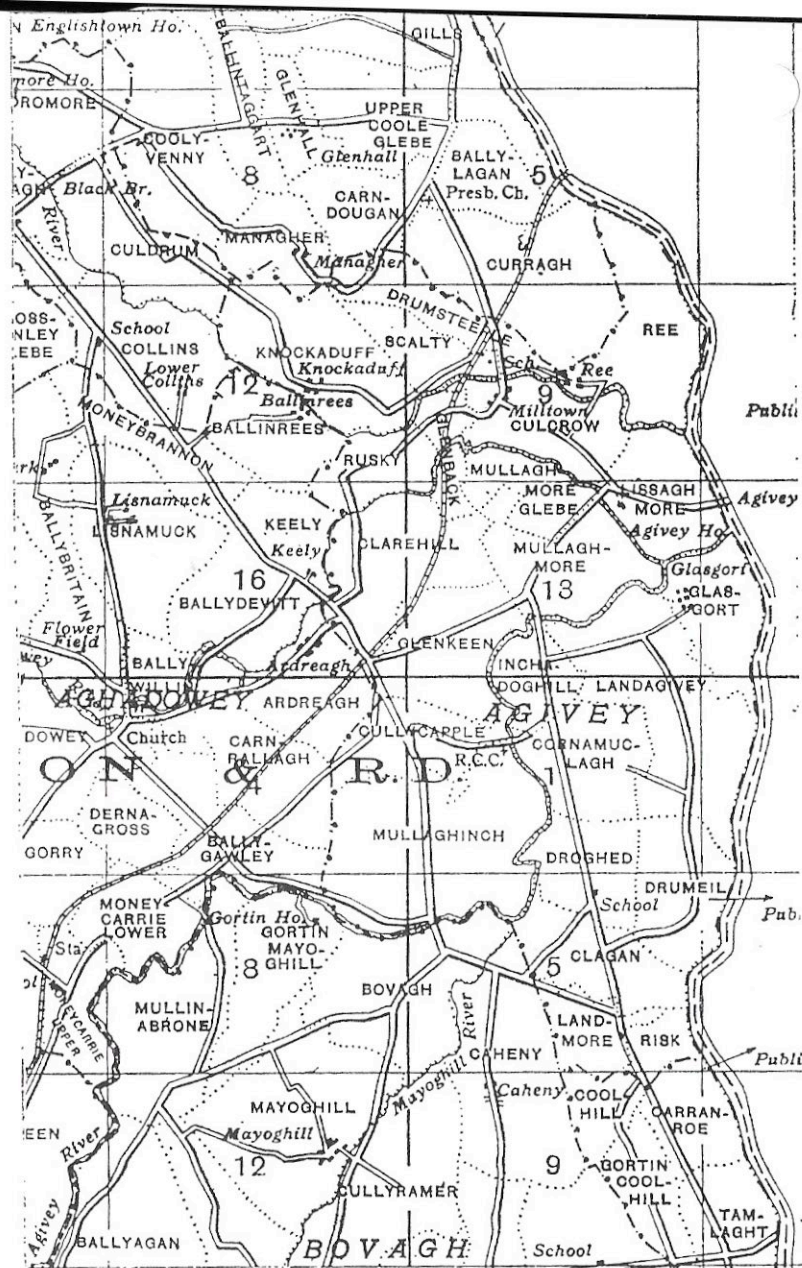

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ish gentlemen, as well as Irish farmers, continued to live in the district. An inquisition taken in the first year of Charles the First's reign gives the following names:

Patricke Ballough O'Mergie of Ergell, gent;
Dermot O'Mulligan of Mecoskquin, gent;
Gilly Gorme McHugh of Balerratshanne, gent;
Brian Oge O'Cahan, Desarte, gent;
Shane O'Mullan of Desart, gent;
Gill Duff McBrian of Aghtradowie, gent;
Gill Duff O'Quige of the same, gent;
Gorry McHugh of Ballywollen, gent;
Gill Duff McBrian O'Cahan of Aghadowyne, gent.¹⁰

Some of these will be recognized as living in the parishes of Desertoghill, Aghadowey and Errigal, while others lived across the Bann in Ballyrashane and Ballywillan.

I come now to the question as to what light the Ironmongers' papers throw on the relationship between the Irish in the district and the local settlers under the plantation scheme. A large number of Irish appeared to have given general co-operation in the scheme. On the other hand, a number of Irish kerne, or lightly armed fighting men, took to the woods and harassed the settlers. These fighting men had previously been maintained so as to take part in tribal conflicts, and were out of place in a peaceful society.

On the side of co-operation, it was an Irishman who set out the bounds of the Ironmongers' lands, and it was an Irishman, Daniel O'Quig who collected the May rent just before Canning arrived in Ireland. One item in the accounts shows that four Irishmen were employed in carrying stones from the river to the castle, at a wage of eightpence per day. As we have just seen, the vast majority of the tenants on the estate in 1616 were Irish.

On the other hand, there was the smouldering discontent in County Derry and North Antrim which led to a meeting of Irish gentlemen "at the house of one Gill 3 miles from Coleraine," at which they decided to prepare for a rising. One of those present was Gorry O'Cahan, son of the Manus McCowry Ballagh O'Cahan who had received a large freehold in the Aghadowey district. The result of this meeting in May, 1614, was the 1615

conspiracy, as a sequel to which four persons were hanged, including Gorie McManus O'Chane (just mentioned), late of Moneydig.¹¹

Unrest continued, and in a letter of January, 1616, Canning tells of one particular incident which occurred on the Mercers' Plantation. Early one morning, a number of kerne burst into a house at Lislea where John Brown, a lathmaker, lived. Brown was sitting at the fireside with his wife, who sold drink, with John Williams, another lathmaker, and three Irishmen, their neighbours. The kernes bound and gagged them all, and then started drinking and eating whatever they could find. Both Brown and Williams had servants, who had gone to Movanagher, and when these two men returned, they were attacked with swords and keynes and left for dead. Brown and Williams, bound as they were, were then cut and mangled, and finally the kerne departed about 10 or 11 at night, leaving the woman and the three other Irishmen bound. Brown, Williams and Roger Pye were killed, but the other man miraculously survived, although he had a wound in his head so deep that the brains could be seen.

Canning and his men, of course, had arms. There is an item of expenditure for arms, harness, guns and swords sent from London, costing £15 15s 4d. In May, 1616, Canning wrote for more arms, muskets, cullivers, powder and bullets, for two bullet moulds and four halberds and half pikes. Writing about these troubles Canning says:

"These continuall troubles and dangers must needs be a great hindrance to the whole plantation and a discomfort in the meanwhile to those fewe Englishe that live here in the country, specially near the woods. I pray God in His mercy preserve us from these bloudie minded villaines and put into their minds which are in authority to take some speedie course to cut them off otherwise I fear it will be the overthrow of the whole plantation in these partes yet I thank God I did never fear them but do always pride myself of sufficient strength both at home and abroad (if God please) to defend me from danger of their malice."

Much of the activity of the wood kerne consisted in robbery and intimidation rather than in murder. Writing from Agivey on 11th August, 1616, Canning said that the work was going on well.

noted all of them. At first I thought that these were mixed marriages, and was surprised at the number. On careful study of what is said, I have come to the conclusion that this is not the case. I cite four cases:

20th March 1705. "Ja. Lindsay and Marg^t. McMurtry appeared publicly for their scandal in marrying w(ith) a popish priest and the scandal was removed."

11th October 1715. "Hugh Montgomery appear'd before this session acknowledging That he run away with Jane Cargill in order to be married and that he was clandestinely married without the knowledge and consent of her parents. It appears by two evidences John Freeland and William Hodge, That Hugh Montgomery and Jane Cargill were joined in marriage by Robert Donald curate of Ballymenoch on the 22 of May last w^h also appears by Mr. Donald's certificate."

10th December 1717. "Andrew Gray married Anne Thompson without the knowledge of her father Robert Thompson by one McGradh a popish priest."

6th April 1708. "Jo. Calderwood younger appears and says yt Mary White desired him to go to the priest with her and Dav. Lindsay to be married yt ye sd. Jo. Calderwood might be a witness to the marriage."

Lack of parental consent was probably at the root of most of these marriages before priests.

How far did those of Irish background come into the Presbyterian church? The pages of the old session book contain the names of Grany O'Cahan, Noaly O'Cahan, Elizabeth McLaughlan, Honora O'Higgin, Mave O'Brannon, Elisabeth O'Quig, Manus McLaughlin, Margaret O'Dugan, John O'Quig, Helene O'Cahane. The large majority of these appear upon the poor list, though John O'Quig appears to have been sexton. I find no Irish names in the lists of elders, prospective elders or stipend collectors, and therefore consider that they did not play any important role in the life of the congregation.

McGREGOR FAMILY TREE

This is constructed from information in Parker's history of Londonderry, Young's Fighters of Derry, the Burnside family tree (T.2707 P.R.O.N.I.), and a letter from Professor F. J. Simmons (a descendant).

 - (i) Mary, married Robert Means of Amherst.
 - D. Jane.
 - E. Alexander, married and had daughter:

The Burnside men mentioned (Samuel and Thomas) were sons of James Burnside of Macfin (died 1739) and Elizabeth McAfee. James Burnside had a brother David who lived at Londonderry N.H. and was drowned in the Delaware river in 1761 or 1762. The Burnsides who remained here eventually moved to Secon.

APPENDIX B

SOME FAMILY NOTES

Harriman. Miss Sarah Jane Hunter, daughter of Mr. James Hunter of New York and formerly of Caheney, Aghadowey, married in 1921 Mr. H. M. Harriman, a member of one of New York's richest families. She was his nurse during an illness. (Derry and Antrim Year Book, 1922).

McKay. The Rev. William McKay of Moneydig married in 1864 Mary McCaughey, sister of Sir Samuel McCaughey of Australia.

Getty. J. Paul Getty, the famous oil millionaire, traces his family origins to Gettystown, not far from the Aghadowey district.

Foster. The ancestors of Stephen Foster, the famous composer of popular songs, and of his brother, the Hon. Morrison Foster of Pittsburg, came from Caheney.

Torrens of Coolnaman were thickly settled in this area, and apparently were very clannish. A James Kennedy was said to have been attacked by them in 1810. (D.664/0/5. P.R.O.N.I.). Much information about local Torrens families is contained in extracts from the 1821 Census in T283B (P.R.O.N.I.).

Pedens, of Mayogill. Meohill called a hamlet, as is Caheney, in the Parliamentary Gazetteer of Ireland. Pedens also appear in the 1821 Census as above. Rev. Jonathan Simpson's mother was Martha Peden from here. H. G. McGrattan of the Coleraine Chronicle is descended from the Pedens.

Tannahills. An old family found west of the Bann as far back as 1641 and in Killaig prior to 1765. Alexander Tannahill of Killeague died in 1796, aged 72, and is buried in Agivey.

McSparrans. Found in Lissaghmore as early as 1725. Wm. McSparran of Flanders near Dungiven married Jean, daughter of Hugh McSparran, farmer of Agivey in 1852 in Aghadowey Presbyterian Church.

Moon. A very old name locally. The Wrays of Donegal quotes from the Summonister Roll of 1617 that Henry Moone of Aghadowey was fined £5 for cervisian lupulat at the rate of fourpence per quarter. An Archibald Moon son of David Moon of Aghadowey was at Belfast Inst. in 1828.

Barrs. This family of famous ploughmen comes from the Curragh and has achieved great distinction in international matches.

Thomas. James Thomas was in the linen business at Ballydevitt, and afterwards owned corn and flax mills. His daughter Mary married Archibald Moon, son of Daniel Moon of Lisnamuck and had a son James Thomas Moon who purchased and rebuilt his grandfather's residence. Another daughter of James Thomas, Jane married first McIntyre, and then in 1861 in Aghadowey, the Rev. David Simpson from Scotland. The only Thomas boy who grew up, William John, died in 1858, aged 20, in Beechworth, Australia, according to the Thomas tombstone in Aghadowey.

Jim, I am so impressed with the amount of work you have done! And I have enjoyed reading through all of it. I will give you a few more details and a couple of explanations of "Unknown." Do with them what you will.

Under James Douglas Family Sheet:

Daughter Martha was married briefly to James Bennett (I think it was James; I know it was Bennett) She was killed when a grindstone flew apart.

Mary Etta (wife of Henry McQuigg) had the maiden name of McLaughlin

Willis McQuigg: I never ever heard him called "Willie"; anyway his youngest was a son, Glenn. Lester had several sons and lived/died in Omaha. Clifford married Mildred Trimblee and lived on the family farm west of Schaller until his death. Everett was never married. Betty wasn't either; she got polio as a young woman and was very crippled the rest of her life. Glenn was in the Navy for a long while, I believe, and never returned to Schaller much.

Under Lillian: "eccentric" is an understatement. She was a hippy before there were hippies. We loved her, even though she embarrassed our dad to death. She went to California on the train for many years to visit her twin daughters who lived in the Van Nuys (Valley) area. When I went to the army in 1950 I was sent to Camp Cooke (Vandenbergh), California, and even though she had said for years that her health would not allow another trip out there, she made it because she wanted to show me around. Did she ever.

Her twin daughters were Maybelle and Martha, who went by Marcie. She married Les Johnson and they had two daughters, Sharon is one. (Margaret has heard from her; she is married to a policeman and lives in LA. Les always said he "married the twins." Maybelle lived with them until her death. They were CHARACTERS! Les was a sporting goods salesman for Kerr Sporting Goods in Hollywood and fished with the likes of Clark Gable. All of them went to Las Vegas before there was a Las Vegas.

The brother Paul was never married to our knowledge and worked as a guard at Paramount Studios for many years, even though he lived in Long Beach. Talk about a commute. His nickname was "Crook" and was derived from his reputation as a card shark.

Brother Henry, married to Mary Etta, has one daughter Lenore. They lived in Sioux City.

Under Donald L. Miller:

Mary Margaret's husband's name is Brooke Wennerstrum. They have two sons, Brian and _____, both sharp kids.

Don is buried in Masonic Cemetery, Des Moines, Iowa.

Bruce and Joanie McQuigg were married in 1955, not 1945. Jim and Marcella were married in 1945 or 1946.

Under Bruce McQuigg Sheet:

Susan was married in Midway, Utah (Park City) 3 July 1993. Susan's husband is Lester Johnathan Dixon.

Paul was first married in Monroe County, Indiana, then later in Marion County, Indiana (Indianapolis) to Laura Spainhower. They have sons Mason James, born May 1993, and Mitchell John, b. August 1995, both in Methodist Hospital, Indianapolis.

Dear Mrs/ Jones, -----(Eula (McQuigg) Jones)

My sister Ruth Ann, of Marshalltown brought me your letter last weekend. I am the sister who has tried to keep track of the McQuigg families. I am Margaret Miller--Mrs. Donald Miller of Ankeny--and I am happy to share the following information. I have no idea if there is a connection--I do know the original McQuiggs in our family lived in the Hebrides, off the coast of Scotland--then emigrated to northern Ireland and finally to Canada and then the US. Our branch begins thusly:

Henry McQuigg married and McCauley girl. They lived in County Derry, Parish of Asha Ceeway, town of Colrairie, Ireland. There were 4 children: John, Catherine, James Malcolm and William Henry. John and Catherine never married. James Malcolm and William Henry immigrated to Canada and settled in Ontario.

James Malcom was our great grandfather--¹⁸⁰⁹⁻¹⁸⁹³1804-1883. He married Jane Brown (1811-1872) in 1832. They came to Canada in 1847 with 6 children, and six more were born in Canada.

Robert born in 1833, Henry born in 1836, Mary born in 1839, Jane born in 1841--died in 1921, Elizabeth born in 1843, John born in 1845, William born in 1848, Sarah born in 1850, Margaret born in 1853, James Douglas (our grandfather) born in 1856, Thomas Peter born in 1858, Ida born in 1861. James Douglas, our grandfather was born in Ontario near Williamsburg April 12, 1856. He married Hester Ann Casselman, May 18, 1879 in Sac county Iowa, Schaller. They had 7 children:

Willis Edgar born 1880, Martha Elizabeth born in 1881, Lillian born in 1884, James Franklin born 1886 and died as an infant, Henry born in 1887, Paul born in 1889, Frederick Walter (our father) born in 1893. The father James Douglas died in 1924. He is buried in Scaller cemetery. Hester Ann died in 1917, and is buried in Schaller.

Frederick Walter married Doris Gould in Madison, Wisc. June 7, 1918. Their children are James Donald born in 1920. Died 1985. Margaret Ellen (me) born in Oct. 1922, Robert Bruce born in 1927, Paul Harold born in 1928, died in 1930, Doris Louise born in 1935, Ruth Ann born in 1937.

My brother Jim corresponded with a lady in Springfield, Missouri whose mother was a McQuigg. I am sorry I do not have her address. Our brother Bruce is a professor at Indiana University in Bloomington, I live in Ankeny and am a retired teacher, Doris Louise lives in Merriam, Kansas, and Ruth Ann lives in Marshalltown.


